November **Historic Edenton.** Edenton. Walking Tours featuring Edenton's diverse architectural styles. *Fee charged.* Call 252-482-2637 for more information. Each Wednesday.

November 1 **Governor Charles B. Aycock Birthplace** Fremont. A Double Anniversary and Grand Re-opening. This celebration marks the 150th anniversary of Governor Aycock's birth and the 50th anniversary of the opening of the historic site. It will also mark the re-opening of the birthplace which suffered significant damage in a fire in January, 2009. The Charles B. Aycock High School marching band will kick off the ceremony. Visitors can meet "Governor Aycock" as he arrives in a horse-drawn wagon to welcome them to his newly restored home. Costumed interpreters will give living history demonstrations in blacksmithing, open-hearth cooking, spinning and apple-cider making. Music will be provided by the bluegrass group Sapyony Creek. At 3 p.m. visitors can learn about the "Legacy of Segregated Education" from a three-person panel. At 3:30 special guest speaker George Holding, U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of North Carolina, will talk about his office and how the position has changed since Aycock held that post (1893-1897) before serving as governor (1901-1905). Activities will take place from 1-5 p.m.
